WHONNOCK CEMETERY PLAQUE CELEBRATION

A place known for its peace and quiet was alive and happening one Saturday morning. That was when the Community Heritage Commission celebrated the centennial of the Whonnock Cemetery and the unveiling of a commemorative plaque, on Saturday May 20th, 2006 at 11:30 a.m. at the Cemetery on 96th Avenue, Whonnock.

Nina Unger, a descendent of the original Norwegian settlers was asked to welcome all with a few words in Norwegian.

Commission member Jim Connor added his own magic touch in emceeing the event, engaging the audience, and keeping the festivities lively.

Local historian Fred Braches, (who designed the commemorative plaque) outlined the historical significance of the site. The cemetery was started in 1905 by the Norwegian Lutheran Community of Whonnock. The commemorative plaque reflects on the early days and in particular remembers the Lee family who were instrumental in the creation of the cemetery.
