# Watermain Replacements on Dewdney Trunk Road and 227 Street

The City has planned watermain replacements on Dewdney Trunk Road (DTR) from Edge Street to 228 Street and on 227 Street from DTR to 121 Avenue. The work generally consists of installation of approximately 310m of watermain on DTR and 235m of watermain on 227 Street north of DTR, tieins of existing service connections, installation of new fire hydrants, installation of fibre optic ducting on the existing watermain and surface restorations.



Pedre Contractors Ltd. commenced construction the first week of August and anticipate completion by the first week of October, weather permitting. The watermain installation on 227 Street is complete and the Contractor is now working on Dewdney Trunk Road. Pressure and chlorination tests will follow immediately after installation of the watermain on Dewdney Trunk Road. Water service connection transfers will be in mid-September. Please plan for detours and thank you for your patience during construction.

Help keep wildlife wild and communities safe by not setting out your garbage, organics or recycling bins early. Did you know that in Maple Ridge we have a Wildlife and Vector Control Bylaw that states when bins are to be placed out for collection and when they are to be removed.

Maple Ridge Wildlife and Vector Control Bylaw No. 7437-2018 states receptacles are to be placed out no earlier than 5:00 am on collection day and are to be removed no later than 7:00 pm on collection day. Fines of \$200 may be issued for each occurrence.

### Garibaldi Secondary School Sports Court Renovation

The pickleball and tennis courts were paved this week after the contractor completed the excavation, base compaction and drainage work needed to repair the court base. When completed, this court will have six pickleball courts and two tennis courts.

The court lines and perimeter fencing will be added in the next few weeks to complete the project. We anticipate that these courts will be open to the public again by the end of September.



### **MRSS Running Track Surface Renewal**

The running track at Maple Ridge Secondary School has been re-sprayed with a new top coat and new track lines to prepare for the 2020 BC Summer Games next year. The top coat provides (ultra-violet) protection for the rubber base as well as a coloured running surface. The track is now open again for public use.



# **Telosky Stadium Fieldhouse Construction**

Work continues on the new fieldhouse which when complete, will house a new concession, washrooms and two sets of team change rooms for the sports fields. The building is starting to take shape with the concrete slab poured, electrical and mechanical rough-ins underway, and several courses of the masonry block walls set in place. A public art piece is being designed for the building exterior and will be in place when the building is completed at the end of November.





## Lake Lovely Water 2019 PRC Youth Mountaineering Trip

Since 1994, PRC Youth have embarked on a special 5-day mountaineering trip to Lake Lovely Water. The trip focuses on pushing your physical limits, an escape from technology and screen time, leadership development and team building. Lake Lovely Water is such a special place that helps create memories and bonds that last a lifetime! Located by Brakendale in the Coast Mountains, it is one of the most magnificent lakes in Southwestern BC with breathtaking views of Mount Omega, Mount Niobe or several other of the 6,600-foot plus peaks in the area.

Youth hike with 5-day packs for approximately 8 hours to reach their destination which is over 4,000 feet above sea level. Upon arrival, youth stay in an A-frame cabin with 20 youth participants and staff team. The cabin has no running water, electricity or Wi-Fi and is a truly back to nature experience. While there, youth fish for rainbow trout, canoe or rowboat and hike to the neighboring meadow and lakes.
