

#### Caboose (No. 437115)

This 1944 CPR Caboose is one of a rare few remaining all-wood cabooses from WWII days. One side has the popular "script" lettering and the other side has the first "block" scheme. The interior retains the in-service configuration.

#### 2 Maple Ridge Museum

The Maple Ridge Museum is housed in the 1907 manager's home for the Port Haney Brick and Tile Company, which operated until 1977. After demolition of the brick works, the land and two remaining buildings were donated to the City by the Baynes family for a park.

### 3 Brickyard Office

The office for the Port Haney Brick and Tile Company was built in 1930 of solid brick, tile and cement as a workspace and a showcase for the Brick Company. Located in Jim Hadgkiss Park, it is part of the Maple Ridge Museum and is used for meetings, activities and work spaces.

#### 4 Haney House & Orchard

The home was built in 1883 on a hill overlooking the Fraser River by pioneer Thomas Haney for his family. They came to Maple Ridge in 1876 and founded the town of Port Haney in 1882. Surrounding Haney House are heritage gardens and remnants of the original orchard.

#### 5 Old Post Office

The Old Post Office stood on Fraser Street to serve as the Haney Post Office from 1939 until 1951. It was used by several retail stores until the Maple Ridge Historical Society moved it in 1979 to Callaghan Park where it serves as a preschool.

### 6 Pedestrian Underpass

The pedestrian underpass provides an easy and safe route to cross the Haney Bypass. The underpass is equipped with both a ramp and stairs at either end of the underpass. There is an incline on either end of the pedestrian underpass.

### 7 Port Haney Wharf

The Port Haney Wharf and Office is a false front building that was constructed in 1935 as a real estate and insurance office in upper Haney. It was moved in 1950 when the Post Office on 224 Street was built. It was moved again onto the Port Haney Wharf after restoration



The Post Office was housed in various general stores until this building was erected in 1932 as the first separate post office. Because many businesses had moved to the upper town, this building was used as a post office only until 1939.

#### Bank of Montreal

The Bank of Montreal was opened in 1911 and was the first and only bank in the community. It had living quarters upstairs for the manager. When the present Bank of Montreal was built on the Lougheed Highway in 1932, this building was used for housing. The building was restored as the Billy Miner Pub in 1981.

# 10 St. Andrew's Manse

Built in 1905, the first occupants were Rev. William Reid and his seven children. It was sold in 1957 to buy a new Manse and remains as a private home today. The Manse remains as a landmark in the area and maintains its historial relationship to the Church.

#### 11 St. Andrew's (Heritage Church Hall)

The brick-faced St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church was built as a Presbyterian Church in 1888 on land donated by Thomas Haney. The steeple was added in 1934 to house the Methodist Church bell. St. Andrew's became a United Church in 1926 and continued to serve a congregation until 1957 when it was replaced by the larger church at 222 Street and Dewdney Trunk Road. The heritage church is now used as a small community hall, operated by the Maple Ridge Historical Society.

# 12 Prince David's Lodge Masonic Hall

The Prince David Lodge Masonic Hall was originally constructed on the Lougheed Highway (north side between 224 Street and 225 Street) in 1931, and moved to its present location on 116 Avenue in 1980. The hall has been in continuous use since it was built.



# PORT HANEY HERITAGE WALK

The Port Haney Heritage Walk links the key heritage sites in Port Haney. The walk is located just South of downtown Maple Ridge along the Fraser River and Haney Bypass.

The Port Haney Heritage Walk is open year round. You can start your walk at the Maple Ridge Museum located on 116 Avenue.

As you continue walking West on 116 Avenue you will take in various buildings as you wind through a residential area and arrive at Brickwood Park on the corner of 225 Street and 116 Avenue. Continue West on 116 Avenue to the corner of Fraser Street. Here you will follow the path into the property of the historic Haney House. Head North to visit the old Post Office, then walk South on 224 Street, through the underpass.

As you come out on the South end of the pedestrian underpass you will arrive at Storey Green Park. Continue heading South towards the Fraser River. At this point you can cross the train tracks to the refurbished Port Haney Wharf. The Wharf is now equipped with a landing for river traffic. Next follow River Road past the old Bank of Montreal and head North along 223 Street to view St. Andrew's Church.
